


Advisor Institute - Spring 2018



Although we use standardized test scores to inform course placement, they do not always accurately reflect knowledge and ability. Last summer, College Enrichment Program (CEP) worked with offices across campus to provide Accuplacer placement testing to students who would otherwise be placed in Academic Foundations courses; two-thirds of those who took math placed up.
