Engaging students in undergraduate research is one of the high impact practices identified for higher education. Do we have evidence from UNM general education courses that supports this claim? In this session, I describe a General Chemistry sequence, CHEM 131/132 and CHEM 123L/124L (1215L and 1225L) and discuss the assessment data collecting from these courses to demonstrate a direct evidence of increasing student learning due to course-based undergraduate research experience.

What is Geography?

Chris Duval, Associate Professor: Geography

Many Americans do not know have experience with this academic discipline, which is definitely not about memorizing state capitals, and is certainly not the same as geology. Geographers study spatial patterns across the Earth's surface, and the complex processes that create these processes. UNM's Department of Geography and Environmental Studies offers three courses in the general education core curriculum.

PH101: Introduction to Population Health

Population health is a new field that combines public health and health care delivery. It is about using the tools of prevention to promote health and social justice in clinical and community settings. In this talk, I will discuss a new effort to help students in our core curriculum practice basic research skills while exploring contemporary health issues. This work is the result of the 2018-2019 Academic Affairs General Education Fellows Undergraduate Research Community of Practice. Bringing Research into the Core: Linguistics 2110, Introduction to Study of Language

Dawn Nordquist, Lecturer III: Linguistics

In this session, I will demonstrate what partial (as opposed to full) undergraduate research experiences can look like in the core with specific examples in LING 2110, *Introduction to the Study of Language*. Past students report that a series of these partial research experiences helped them to understand content and to have greater confidence in conducting research. This work is the result of the 2018-2019 Academic Affairs General Education Fellows Undergraduate Research Community of Practice.

Community-Engaged-Learning (CEL) version of ENGL 2210, Professional and Technical Communication Julianne Newmark, Principal Lecturer III: English

In the CEL ENGL 219, community-engaged learning is situated centrally in the course design, as the middle 6-week module. Students' communication skills develop during the semester so that in the central module, students can create communication outputs to directly support the important work of local community organizations. Reciprocally, students gain insight into the local non-profit landscape and understand the potential for their communication skills to serve a broad array of readers, viewers, listeners, and users.

The Transition from CNM to UNM: The Student Experience

This will be a presentation including several factors for consideration: 1) The students' prior advisement experiences [K-12]. 2) The students' present advisement experience with current advisor(s). 3) The advisement style of the current advisor. 4) How vested the advisor is in the student. 5) Ethnicity, gender, age, etc. of both parties.

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
