Dr. Lo holds a doctorate degree in Higher Education Management from the University of Pennsylvania.



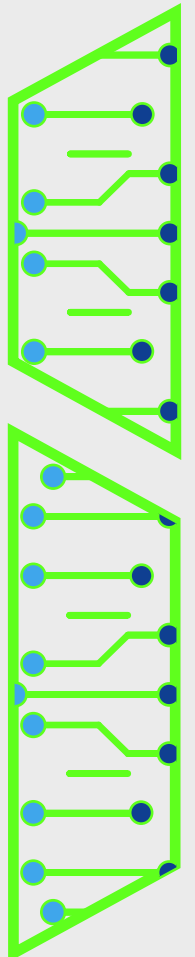

The goal is to empower academic advisors to leverage AI as a supportive tool, augmenting their capabilities without replacing the invaluable human elements of empathy and personalized guidance.

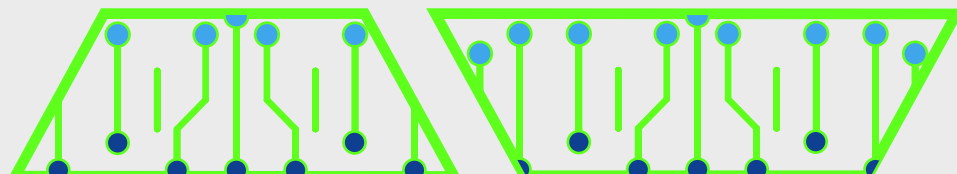

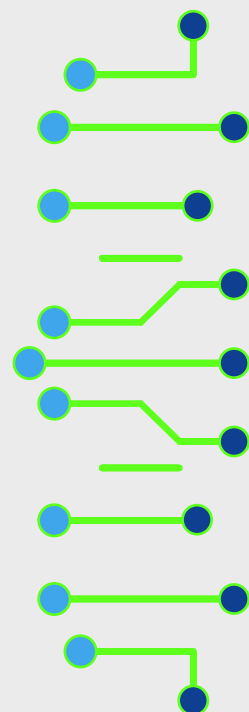

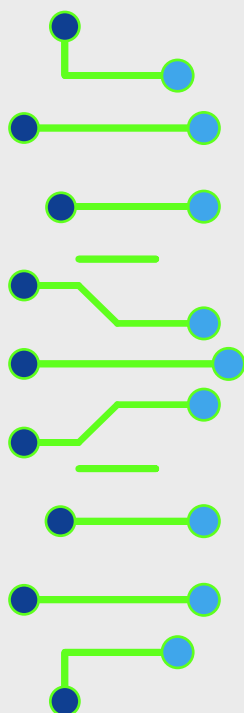

Senior = Multiple years

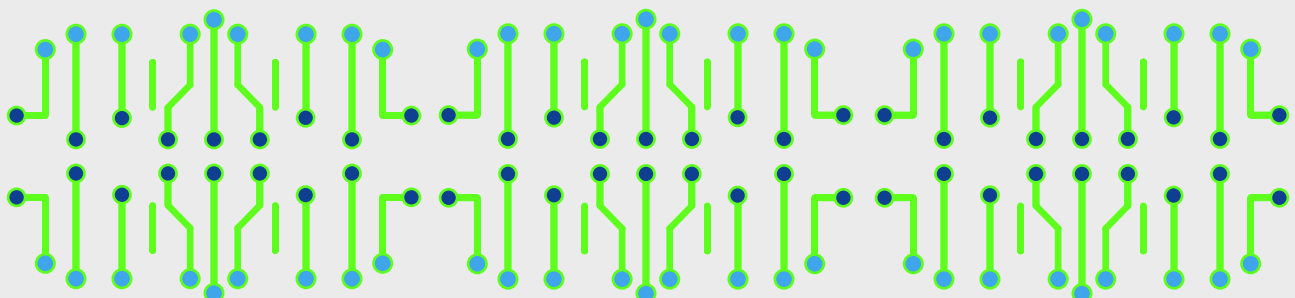

Advisors are subject to multiple things demanding our attention. It is very hard to give our full attention to a single person or task. All these competing stimuli fracture our attention and prevent us from connecting with other people. I propose that we cultivate “close listening,” which is similar to “deep listening,” but is distinguished from it by a crucial difference: deep listening is free from judgments and suggestions, while close listening involves hearing need and finding solutions.

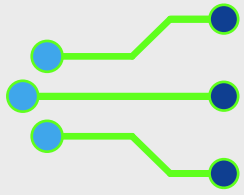

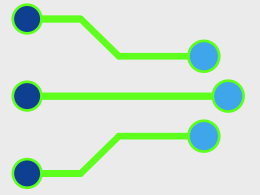
